Developer fees

Overhaul of council charges will take burden off ratepayers

DEVELOPERS could fork out tens of thousands of dollars in Kingston Council planning application fees under an overhaul of the system.

Under new rules, they will be slugged for council officer time, legal fees and advertising costs if they want to rezone land in the growing pocket of Melbourne's south.

The council said it recently spent an estimated \$36,000 on a proposal that made it partway through the planning scheme amendment process while the developer paid just \$2871.

Kingston planning and development general manager Jonathan Guttmann said that under the new policy, the council would have recouped

\$33,000 of those costs.

"Kingston Council is seeking to have the applicant, who will benefit from the rezoning, cover a fairer share of the planning scheme amendment process," Mr Guttman said.

Until now, Kingston charged developers an application fee of \$2871, some of the costs of panel hearings, which are usually about \$10,000-\$15,000 and analysing submissions which can cost up to \$38,000.

It will now be able to charge developers for advertising costs, including in the local newspaper; legal fees; peer reviews on expert reports; and everything associated with planning panel hearings. In extreme cases, developers may even need to pay for in-house resources

such as a dedicated officer to process their application.

Mr Guttmann said ratepayers were currently left to fund these costs, which were increasingly taking up the council's time.

He said the fees would vary for each applicant, depending on the complexity and scale of the proposed development.

However, Danni Addison, the Urban Development Institute of Australia's Victorian chief executive, said to justify increased planning application fees, more focus was needed on making councils and the planning framework operate more effectively.

"A failure to do this will cause Victoria to fall behind all the other states in the country in terms of planning," Ms Addison said.

Second reprieve for tree hacker

A MACHETE-wielding tree hacker who destroyed tens of thousands of dollars' worth of trees in several suburbs has again walked free from court.

Sam Cohen, 21, of Heatherton, (pictured) faced the Moorabbin Magistrates' Court on October 5 for sentencing related to a tree-hacking rampage in Heatherton, Braeside Park, Clayton South, Cheltenham and Mordialloc between August and November last year.



He had pleaded guilty earlier this year and Magistrate Timothy Gattuso had previously deferred the matter to allow Mr Cohen to comply with an unrelated corrections order issued over an attempted armed robbery.

Defence lawyer Anna Balmer told the court on October 5 that Mr Cohen's case manager had indicated he'd significantly improved his behaviour, but she preferred sentencing to wait until another judicial monitoring hearing was held.

"He's wanting to show the court he's able to rehabilitate himself," Ms Balmer said.

Police prosecutor Sergeant Mark Thomson did not object to the adjournment.

Mr Gattuso agreed to hold off on sentencing until November 16, so he could review whether Mr Cohen continued to comply with the conditions set out on his existing corrections order.

"I'm pleased to hear you've made some changes since His Honour (at the County Court) has spoken to you," Mr Gattuso said.

"I hope your current progress continues."

Mr Gattuso encouraged Cohen to engage in programs to assist in mental health and drug and alcohol issues.
