

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The learning and teaching program at Kilbreda College is both dynamic and innovative, catering for the students' spiritual, academic, social, emotional and physical development. Students are challenged to be creative, critical and reflective thinkers and to develop a broad and transferable skill set. Opportunities for both independent and collaborative learning are provided and contemporary technologies are integrated throughout the learning and teaching program.

Religious Education is at the heart of the school curriculum. Students have opportunities to explore tradition and practices, Church history, Christian values and morality and interfaith dialogue. They also learn how to connect their cultural and life experience with religion and look at faith and spirituality to help make sense of the world. Religious Education, together with many other aspects of school life, builds in our students an understanding of themselves and their identity that has connections with people that have gone before them. Students are also encouraged to practise prayer and meditation and to participate in a variety of liturgies and rituals influenced by the Church's liturgical calendar. They engage in reflection days and retreats, as well as

participate in a broad range of community building events.

An integral part of the Religious Education curriculum is our commitment to social justice. There are various ways in which students, staff and families engage in matters of social justice at the College and in the wider community, and through these contributions make a real difference in our world.

Social justice at the College includes the *Educating for Justice* group, FIRE Carriers, *Stand Up Against Poverty*, Project Compassion, Brigidine Asylum Seeker Project (BASP) and support of initiatives for Kildare Ministries.

The Religious Education program aims to help students reflect on their beliefs and values, foster their own spirituality and to reach out to others in our world, inspiring Kilbreda girls to live the Brigidine motto of *Strength and Kindliness*.
